Planning a Community Garden

There are many factors to consider before starting a community garden. Your decisions should be based on the size and scope of your project. The American Community Gardens Association is a good resource to guide you through the process. Their website, **www.communitygarden.org** contains guidelines on the following topics:

- 1. Form a Planning Committee
- 2. Choose a Site
- 3. Prepare and Develop the Site
- 4. Organize the Garden (plot size, layout, membership)
- 5. Insurance (landowners may require liability insurance)
- 6. Setting up a New Gardening Organization (garden purpose, objectives, by-laws)
- 7. How to Manage Your Community Garden (applications, guidelines, rules)
- 8. Troubleshooting (deterring vandalism)
